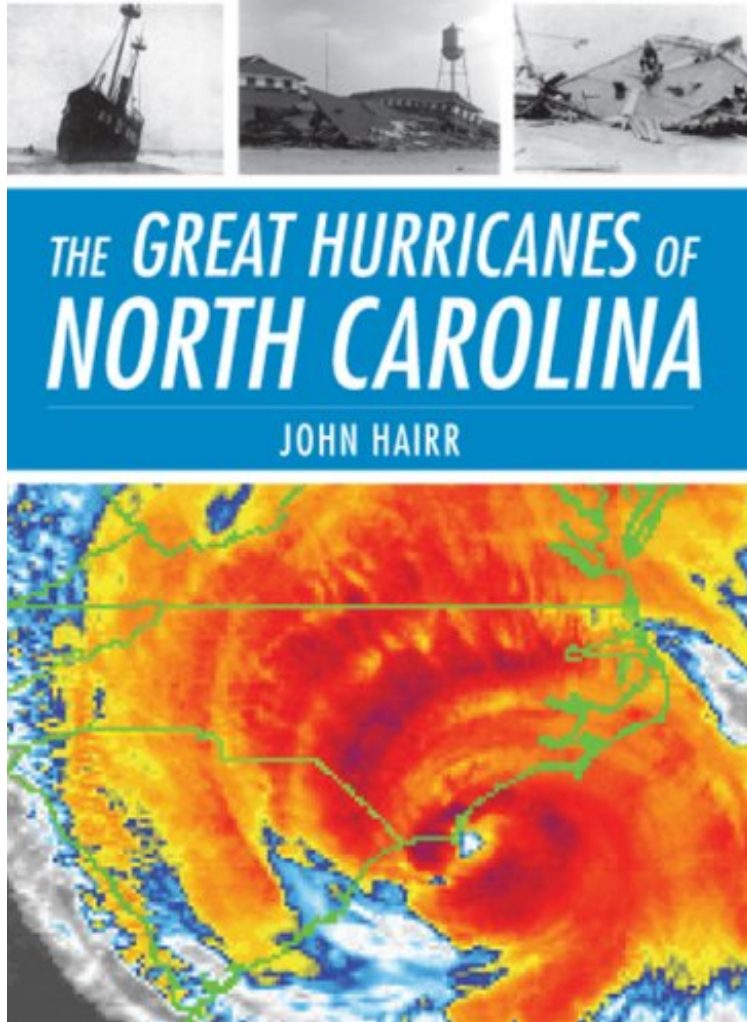


Great Hurricanes of North Carolina
